# Welcome to the third P4Play project newsletter!

Now that we are well into the P4play research & educational programme, this year it has been time for us to reflect back over the last 3 years, and to look ahead at the same time!

This year, the P4Play project has had a wonderful year of research, collaboration, and knowledge translation, which means we have been focusing now on how the new insights and advanced knowledge on play that has been developed, can be utilised to best effect.

We finally had the pleasure of meeting with our partners in Glasgow in June, which has been an overall goal from the start of our collaboration but was badly impacted by Covid-19. Together, we had a wonderful day of presenting summary findings so far, and exploring ideas on what this might mean for play advocacy, policy, and practice. An outcome of this event was that each area of our play research (people, place, policy, and practice) now has a draft knowledge translation plan with sample ideas for how this knowledge could be used for different audiences and in different contexts.

Our P4play team presented at numerous national and international conferences, both separately and as a group, and collaborated as a consortium at our third and final in-person training school in Sweden in August. We have hit the headlines with our groundbreaking research on Play in radio interviews, blogs, and newspaper articles! P4Play is becoming a well-known entity in the international forum of Occupational Science in Europe and beyond.

We are excited to report that one of our doctoral students completed her Viva Defence on 24th November 2023 in Sweden, making her the first P4Play Alumni.

It is an exciting time for P4Play.

So now we are looking to the future. The project has been granted an amendment, allowing us to extend the programme until June 2024. We are exploring sustainable ways to offer the P4Play programme in the future, embedding the structures and partnerships that we have created in our universities and with our partners.

# About P4Play

P4Play is a European funded programme that established the first PhD in Occupational Science in Europe in 2020. The programme was devised in response to the low levels of doctoral training available for Occupational Therapy across Europe and no established discipline in Occupational Science. It aligns with the Marie Sklodowska-Curie (MSC) vision for excellence in doctoral education in Europe and is funded through the MSC Innovative Training Network programme. This enabled us to establish a collaboration between 4 academic and 15 partner organisations in Europe and the USA.

The P4PLAY research programme addresses four areas of play: People, Place, Policy and Practice (P4PLAY). Two ESRs are focused on each of the areas of P4Play: People, Place, Policy and Practice. Each ESR is affiliated to two universities in two different countries which is established as good practice for enhancing research skills and mobility of the workforce for Europe.

The overall research goal is to develop new knowledge on the occupation of play and play deprivation, the impact of physical, socio-cultural, and policy environments on play provision, and the development of innovative solutions to address barriers and provide solutions to play provision in diverse community settings to benefit children, families, and communities.

The rationale for P4PLAY is to combine the needs of those who work with children at risk of play deprivation, with the research skills of academics who are experts in occupational science.

# **2023:** The year in review

This past number of months has seen a change in emphasis for the P4Play project team. Many of our researchers are entering the final stretch of the PhD research and, as a group, we remain conscious of the commitments to share the outputs of our research for benefit our project partners and the broader community in clear and tangible ways.

Early in the year, we asked our colleague, Dr. John Barimo, from the Centre for the Integration of Research, Teaching and Learning in UCC, to come and speak to the P4Play team about knowledge transfer and how to ensure authentic community engagement and effective impact of the results of the project.

Our Early-Stage Researchers (ESRs) worked in teams, supported by members of the supervision team, to capture the knowledge generated across the four guiding themes of the project: "People, Place, Policy and Practice". The teams presented their findings at a workshop for P4Play partners in Glasgow in June, in advance of the IPA conference.

The one-day Knowledge Transfer workshop was held in Glasgow Caledonian University and was attended by several partners from the broader P4Play consortium. This workshop provided interactive opportunities to collaboratively explore some of the early findings generated by all of the ESR's and to discuss how these might be actioned such that they could contribute to meaningful change for children, families and communities.

Participation in the IPA conference 2023 in itself was a highlight of the year, with each of the 8 ESRs presenting at the conference. Scheduling the Knowledge Transfer workshop against the backdrop of the largest international conference on the topic of play offered many advantages, none more so than providing the context for ESRs to share their work and research findings, availing of the feedback and critique of their research peers.

As an active project partner, Occupational Science Europe (OSE) invited the P4Play team to present an update on the development of an Occupational Science curriculum for PhD students in a European context at the OSE conference in Odense, Denmark, in August.

All groups continued working on their assigned theme ahead of the final P4Play Training School, hosted this year by Lulea Technological University (LTU) in Sweden.

The Training School at LTU provided an opportunity to reflect on and assimilate team members' learning from engaging in a process of thinking about how knowledge gained during the project could be sustainably used to effect desired change and the constraints in place due, amongst other things to the relatively short nature of the overall programme.

The final training school focussed on both developing ESR's vision of their careers post PhD and built upon their communication and dissemination skills. This visit also provided the entire team with an incredible opportunity to experience the life and culture of the most northerly university in Europe while gaining an appreciation of all that Northern Sweden had to offer.



# P4Play Training School 3: Playing at the Top of Europe

Within touching distance of the Artic Circle the Norrbotten County in Sweden was the playground for the play researchers and academics that comprise the P4Play project. After three years on this EU funded project, it was finally time for Lulea Technological University (LTU) to host the P4Play consortium and the third and final training school for all our Supervisors and Early-Stage Researchers.

The most northerly University in Europe is also home to the Department of Occupational Therapy who alongside their research expertise in areas such as play, technology enhanced OT practice and elderly care, serve as one of the major learning centres for OT in Sweden.

A powerful and moving opening presentation by the Swedish Ombudsperson for Children set the tone for the week reminding all of those present of the importance of research guided by children's rights and of the enormous challenges faced by children and families across many parts of the work.

The warm welcome by Faculty staff from LTU highlighted the similarities between the various institutions participating in the P4Play project and emphasised the commitment that staff at LTU had to ensuring the sustainability of the successes of the project.

The final P4Play Training School set-out to build on the delivery of high-quality, industry relevant, transferrable skills for the Early-Stage Researchers (ESR) in the project. Focussing on building communication skills, engaging audiences beyond academia and curating their post-PhD brand the training school provided individual and group learning opportunities over the course of a very busy week. Early-Stage Researchers had a chance to develop their 'on-camera skills' by scripting, filming and editing a short video presenting their research for mainstream, nonacademic audiences.

With a focus on life after completing their PhD, there was an emphasis in the Training School programme on looking at opportunities such as future funding opportunities, building partnerships and networks and how to write successful grant applications.

Time was provided as well to give Supervisors a chance to meet, discuss progress, chat with ESR's and firm up plans for the next few, final months of the project.

Needless to say, the Training School was not just about work, but of course provided plenty of opportunities for 'play', the highlight of which was probably a visit to the Cape Wild Moose Farm on the outskirts of Lulea.

P4Play participants had plenty of time to discuss and debate the differences between moose, reindeer and elk.

Despite all the love for moose, thankfully all were safely left behind in their northern homes as ESR's and project staff bade farewell to the staff of LTU and returned to their host institutions in Scotland, Switzerland and in Ireland.



# Tokyo Metropolitan Government

### Visit to Cork & P4play September 2023

On 8th September 2023, our P4play researcher Rianne Jansens coordinated a special visit to Cork from a team from the Child-Oriented Policy office, Tokyo Metropolitan Government of Japan.

Ms. Biwa Matsuda and Ms Kato Nanase visited Ireland on behalf of the Tokyo Metropolitan government, to explore ideas about supporting children's participation in urban planning and provision. This was closely aligned with Rianne's research in an Irish context, particularly as it relates to playgrounds.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Tokyo Metropolitan Government (TMG) is the largest municipality (city council) in Japan, which has 14 million population. Two of these 14 million inhabitants of Tokyo are children/young people in a dense multicultural city in the most-ageing country in the world.

There seems to be an increasing awareness that attention needs to be paid to children and to young families as the birth rate is so low.

Therefore, to strengthen connections with children and young people within their communities, TMG established the Liaison Office for Child-Oriented Policies in 2022 to aim to achieve the society 'filled with children's smiles'.

Ahead of the establishment of the Liaison Office, the TMG Basic Ordinance on Children came into effect in 2021. This ordinance aims to promote children's policies from children's points of view in accordance with the spirit of the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child.

#### THE IRISH VISIT:

As part of the programme of work to develop such child-oriented policies and practices, Biwa and Kato visited Ireland early September to find out more about how we approach this work here:

- They had meetings in Dublin with people from DCEDIY, with Dublin City Council, with Dublin Comhairle na nOg, with Hub na nOg.
- In Cork, they met with our P4play and play colleagues in the Cork City council, and in Crann. Our colleague Denise Cahill (Cork Healthy Cities and Child Friendly Cities) explained and showed how grass roots developments in our city led to innovations and creating greenery and playspaces for example Blackrock Pier and Marina Park.

 In Crann Centre, the Head of Crann, Padraig Mallon and colleagues showed the visitors the centre 2023. including the play and leisure area which was a project that was co-designed by the children and young people of Crann; and explained how a familycentred approach is practiced, and how they provide services fitting to the families' needs in participation.

As part of their work in Tokyo so far, the visitors have developed leaflets explaining children's rights together with children and young people. Here in Ireland, they were looking for examples on how to practice children's participation in decision-making processes for themselves as policy makers as well as for the young people who will form the Comhairle na nOg of Tokyo.

Biwa and Nanase will follow up on this first visit with a second visit to Ireland in March 2024. This time they are considering visiting Cork on Friday 29th March 2024 with 10 young people between 12 and 18 years old, and plan to visit Cork City council and Crann again.

On behalf of the TMG, we would like to thank Denise and Padraig (and other colleagues from Crann Centre): the Tokyo visitors were very pleased and happy with what they have heard and seen.

Although the Tokyo context is very different from Cork, they really appreciated opportunities to hear how others have established structures/processes for creating childfriendly developments with opportunities for listening to children's voices.

'Hearing children's voices and reflecting the voices to policies are the most important things in Japan too. However, we have only a few facilities, parks and urban developments with children's point of view in Japan.

We think if children in Tokyo are able to visit such facilities, parks or urban developments during their stay in Ireland, their understanding of children's rights will deepen more'


### **Publications in 2023**
